From the desk of Fr. Paul:  
“Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world, have mercy on us!” These words are very familiar to us. We sing or pray these words three times right before we have the privilege of receiving Jesus in the Eucharist. But why this imagery of the lamb? What does the lamb have to do with Jesus? A very good question and the answer to which is very scripturally rich.

We first hear about the significance of the lamb in Exodus when the Israelites are in captivity in Egypt. When God prepares the Israelites to finally leave Egypt, He does so by having the people prepare a Passover meal. This Passover meal included a lamb that was without spot or blemish, roasted whole and entirely eaten and the blood of the lamb smeared on the doorposts of the homes of the faithful Israelites. Each of these elements has deep symbolic meaning that prefigures Jesus who is the Lamb of God. First of all, Jesus was without sin and perfect which corresponds to the lamb’s spotless and without blemish appearance. Second, the Passover would not be complete unless the lamb was fully consumed. Similarly, when Jesus had his last supper with His disciples, it was a meal in which He offered His own Body and Blood to be eaten. This sacred meal was made perfect by Jesus’ sacrifice on the Cross for us. Lastly, the blood of the lamb on the doorposts is what saved the Israelites from the angel of death. It was the sign that proved which families obeyed the commandment of God to sacrifice the lamb. Similarly, Jesus’ sacrifice on the Cross has saved us from our sins. He took on the sin of the world and offered his very life so that we can be set free from the slavery of sin and have the ability to have the freedom, peace and joy that only God can give.

This Exodus background gives the context for how Jesus is called the Lamb of God. In the book of Revelation, Jesus is featured prominently as the Lamb of God. The Apostle John received visions which described the heavenly liturgy and the grandeur of God. It is fascinating that when St. John was looking at the heavenly host, he expected that God would be depicted as a lion, like the Lion of Judah. However, what he found was the Lamb. Not mighty or magnificent but slain. (Revelation 5:6). And this is the predominant imagery of Christ in the book of Revelation. Yes, Christ is named as ruler, high priest, the first and the last, the Lord of lords and the King of kings. But John saw Jesus as the lamb who was slain on the throne. And the heavenly host sing around the Lamb, “Worthy are You to take the scroll and to break open its seals, for You were slain, and by Your blood You ransomed men for God.” (Revelation 5:9) and “To Him Who sits upon the throne and to the Lamb be blessing and honor and glory and might for ever and ever!... and the elders fell down and worshiped.” (Revelation 5:13-14)

So, the next time we sing the “Lamb of God” at Mass, this is the imagery that we should have. That we are participating in the heavenly liturgy as seen in the book of Revelation. We are taking part in the fulfillment of all things, where Jesus saves us with his blood; where we partake in the sacred meal we receive the fullness of the Lamb of God, Jesus who takes away the sins of the world!
