

They will be talking about their favorite saint and remembering their deceased loved ones, by bringing in a picture and praying before class for the month of November. Won't you join us...here are a few examples for you to do with your families at home:

- 1. Browse an old photo album with someone you love.
- 2. Share a story about a deceased loved one with someone in your family who is younger than you.
- 3. Make a meal or a dessert that reflects your family's heritage or reminds you of an ancestor.
- 4. Go on a mini pilgrimage to a place that has special meaning to your family. Be creative. The journey could take 10 minutes or a couple of hours.
- 5. Visit a cemetery and put flowers on an ancestor's grave.
- 6. Make an audio recording of a family story, and then share with family.
- 7. Attend Mass together as a family. Have a Mass said for a family member that has died.

Parents and Grandparents: share with your children/teens who your Confirmation Saint is and why you picked that particular saint. If they don't have a favorite yet...do some research together as a family!

From The Desk of Fr. Paul

Saint Gertrude was a 13th century German Benedictine nun and mystic. She is most well known for her prayer for poor souls in purgatory, which we will get to in just a little bit. What made Saint Gertrude stand out amid other saints is her devotion to the heart of Jesus. In one of her apparitions, she saw Saint John the beloved disciple and asked him if he heard the heartbeat of Jesus when he rested his head on the chest of Jesus during the Last Supper. He replied that he indeed did, but he wanted this to be revealed at a time when the world would need to rekindle its love for Christ. This apparition refers to this Scriptural verse from the Gospel of John, "One of his disciples, the one whom Jesus loved, was reclining at Jesus' side." John 13:23. Saint Gertrude had that same opportunity to rest her head on the side of Christ during one of her apparitions. Since then, to be close to Jesus' beating heart was a mainstay of Saint Gertrude's spiritual life. In addition, she is well known for her focus on "nuptial mysticism" which means to envision oneself as the bride of Christ. This type of reflection has Scriptural roots in the Book of Revelation where the marriage feast of the lamb to the entire Church takes center stage. In women religious orders, the imagery of becoming the bride of Christ is very prevalent, even to the effect that when some religious orders have their first profession as sisters, the sister will wear a bridal gown. After the vows are taken the sister then dresses in the religious habit of the nuns. I guess that was a long tangent that explains how many women religious orders Saint Gertrude have to thank for this beautiful imagery of being Christ's bride.

The reason I wanted to highlight the life of Saint Gertrude is not only that her feast day is coming up on November 16th, but also that she had a very important practice of praying for the poor souls in purgatory. This is especially important as we come upon All Souls Day this week. She often prayed for those souls who do not yet see the Beatific Vision, which is the soul's purified state to be able to see God face to face in heaven. The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains purgatory in a beautiful and succinct way, "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation, but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned. The Church formulated her doctrine of faith on Purgatory especially at the Councils of Florence and Trent. The tradition of the Church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture speaks of a cleansing fire." CCC 1030 and 1031. Based on the tradition of the Church, Saint Gertrude composed this prayer for the poor souls in purgatory:

Eternal Father, I offer You the most precious blood of thy Divine Son, Jesus, in union with the Masses said throughout the world today, for all the Holy Souls in Purgatory, for sinners everywhere, for sinners in the universal Church, for those in my own home and in my family. Amen.

During this All Souls Day, we commend those souls near and dear to us who have gone before us to the heart of Christ. Like Saint Gertrude and Saint John, may they rest at the side of Christ.
